Building our power

Matt Price Author and strategist "Perhaps the biggest barrier to making positive change is that **we Canadian activists are ambivalent about power.** Our comfort zone is to cling to the Enlightenment ideal that if we simply tell the truth, then everyone will join us. Eventually. We hope.

This is partly related to Canadian identity, itself. Canadians are comfortable being the humble underdog, and if we win at hockey or other things, it's not because we are entitled to it, but because we worked hard and got some lucky breaks.

Unfortunately, the decision makers who have control over the issues we care about must be convinced that it is in their interest to act a certain way, and if it's the right thing to do, then that's a nice bonus. **The truth may set them free, but it's power that gets them to move.** And, in rationalizing why we are losing, we admit this. We point to the lobbying prowess of industry groups like the Council of Canadian Chief Executives who are in the face of decision makers consistently on every issue that affects them - and our issues almost always do.

Meanwhile, we show up with decision makers only occasionally, and usually with no means to reward or threaten - no means to convince decision makers that it is in their interest to act the right way...

Building power is fundamentally about reaching, recruiting and activating people. It is something our community does well occasionally in NIMBY-like battles, yet something our community does badly on a proactive, consistent basis."

Getting Started Organizing on campus with Dogwood BC

Emphasize selfdetermination and expand the electorate

Support First Nations rights and title

Influence money flows to stop dangerous projects

Our foundational assumption is that organized people can overcome elites and their organized money, but only if we focus.

By tapping into the universal human desire for selfdetermination Dogwood can combine the power of grassroots organizing with the leverage created by First Nation rights and title to reclaim control of land and resources. Integrating these with the ability to influence money flows will create leverage for a more just, equitable, democratic and sustainable future in B.C. B.C. campuses are some of our province's largest employers. People on campuses wield moral, intellectual and cultural influence over the public and decision-makers. Public education is how many global citizens and future Canadians arrive and make a home in Canada.

Students, staff, faculty and residents on them are threatened by fossil fuel infrastructure and the impacts of using and transporting oil, gas, and coal.

So, Dogwood supports **campus teams that bring together everyday people in British Columbia** to claim decisionmaking power over the air, land, and water we depend on.

On Campus Theory of Change

IF Dogwood builds campus teams at select universities and colleges in B.C.;

THEN we can develop leaders and organizing capacity across B.C. and force elected officials to make decisions they otherwise wouldn't, but that the majority of British Columbians want;

BECAUSE Dogwood and our allies would have the power to to elect or defeat candidates in any election-including running a recall--and/or run a citizen's initiative to pass policy if government representatives won't.

Campaign: Stand Strong Against Kinder Morgan

A majority of elected B.C. MLAs have promised to do everything in their power to stop Kinder Morgan's dangerous pipeline and oil tanker project. Amidst backlash from Big Oil and their politician pals, we need our incoming provincial government to stand strong for indigenous rights, for our health and safety, and for a sustainable economy. Justin Trudeau broke his promises and approved Kinder Morgan last fall. How far will he go to get this Texas tanker project built? He faces a new choice now: to actually get this pipeline built, Justin Trudeau will have to sign orders to seize First Nations reserve lands and expropriate provincial crown land along the pipeline route, literally bulldozing homes.

HOW TO: Set up a canvass

Find your People

Use Facebook, personal conversations and classroom visits to recruit canvassers and add them to the Facebook group.

Coordinate 1-3 hours of canvassing when at least two people are available using an online tool like Doodle.

Complete our nondisclosure agreement.

Decide on Location

Select a high-traffic area that offers space to have one-on-one conversations with a potential supporter.

Consider areas close to transit hubs, major lecture halls, cafeterias, and public events.

Keep records of which locations work for you and why.

Train your people

Host a short training at the canvass location or ahead of time.

Share the theory of change for the campaign and any info sheets.

Your Dogwood organizer can help you organize and run a training.

HOW TO: Send us your data

Secure the data

Keep completed petition and sign-up sheets in a safe, locked location.

Enter the data

After you've contacted the volunteer prospects, send petition data to Dogwood.

Complete all the information at the bottom of the sheets.

Enter all petition data into the appropriate form here: <u>dgwd.ca/canvass-tools</u>

Make note of who offered to volunteer and invite them to a future meeting within 48 hours. Add interested volunteers to the Facebook group (and/or Nationbuilder).


After the Canvass

Next Steps for Campus Teams

Skill Development

- Subscribe to the newsletter at <u>OrganizeBC.ca</u> for local training opportunities
- Attend a core Organize B.C. training
- Register to attend CanRoots in November 2017 (canroots.ca)
- Participate in Dogwood's biweekly volunteer leader calls and trainings
- Ask for or attend a media training workshop and build a relationship with campus media
- Survey your team for requested skills/knowledge and ask your Dogwood organizer to coordinate a training

Team Meetings

- Host a team meeting at least monthly while classes are on
- Participate in your home riding team's next meeting (ask your organizer for contact info)
- Organize a topic discussion or invite a guest speaker for your next meeting
- Plan a fundraiser or other activity to support First Nations and other frontline communities

Meeting with Decision-Makers

- Coordinate with Dogwood to meet with the MLAs, MPs, city councillors, and administrative staff for your campus
- Host a government relations training or strategy meeting on campus
